Sheridan's New Mayor and Council Member Cale George

When former Mayor Marianne Thomson resigned from the Sheridan City Council on March 11, it left an open mayor position and a council seat to fill. Fortunately, Cale George, who had served as an elected council person for well over a year, stepped in and nominated himself as mayor with unanimous approval by the council on March 18. Mayor George has lived in Sher-

idan since 1997, bringing a grounded, knowledgeable perspective about city matters to his new position as mayor. However, Mayor George now fills three major roles: mayor, Executive Assistant of Communications with the Sheridan School District, where he has been employed for five years, and most importantly, father to his little one, Reya Lynn. It is essential to Mayor George



Stoney Mountain Reservoir, a 60-million gallon storage system built by the city, to the city's water system. Sheridan currently draws water from underground springs on Stoney Mountain and the Yamhill River. "My main priority is getting Stoney Mountain connected. That's the big project I'd like to complete. I'm not sure if it will be completed during my term as mayor, but I will try my best to work towards getting Stoney Mountain connected to our water system."

When asked what advice he has for incoming council members, Mayor George responded, "Being on the city council is a great way to be involved in the community and help shape the future of our city," which is great advice for incoming council members, as Sheridan has a great future ahead with Mayor George at the helm.

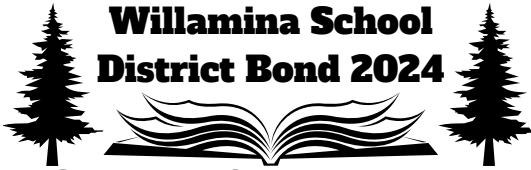

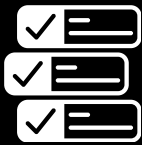

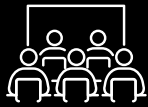
Growing for the Future

About The Bond:

The Willamina School District's proposed \$5,000,000 bond would provide funds to construct five new classrooms, reconfigure traffic flow for pedestrians and vehicles, update existing facilities, improve campus safety, and add an expanded outdoor covered recreation space for all students.



Bond Projects



New Classrooms

- Five new classrooms to accommodate the future growth of our student body and also move classes that are currently in the stand-alone modulares into the main building.



Enhanced Programs

- New classrooms will allow us to expand course offerings, including Culinary Arts and World Languages.



Improved Safety

- Address traffic flow and congestion issues, upgrade security systems, and improve exterior walkways, parking, and lighting. Expand covered play space for elementary students.



Bond Amount Info.

- The proposed bond amount is \$0.49 per \$1,000 assessed property value.
- \$2,500,000 will come from the matching state grant. We only receive this money if the bond is passed.
- \$2,500,000 will come from community funding.
- Taxes are only paid for the \$2,500,000 that would come from community funding.

From the time she worked at the plywood in Willamina on the graveyard shift, she became a "night owl." Even as sick as she was these last couple of months, she would sleep during the day and be up cooking at midnight!

Those who knew Sharon knew her love for her dogs well. When Teddy became too weak to walk, she would put him in a backpack and carry him around. Through the years, she had many beloved pets. Her last dog, Sophie, was just as loved as all the rest.

Sharon is survived by her mother, Shirley Wilson; children, Richie Smith (Amy), Melanie Hubbard (Mike), Joey Smith, Mindy Nichols (Zach); grandchildren, Braden and Reece Ebensteiner, Calle Griffin, Michael Smith, Ezekiel Smith, and one great-grandchild, Navie Joe Griffin-Bailey; siblings, Linda Vollman (John), Keith Wilson, Barry Wilson (Brenda) and Michael Wilson (Judy.) Many nieces and nephews and extended family survived her. Charley Moore, a special friend, also survives her. Sharon was loved by her family and friends and will be greatly missed.

She was pre-deceased by husband, dad, brother Steve and nephew Marcus Vollman; grandparents Claude and Mildred Wilson and Stella Stroud.

Willamina School District (WSD) is seeking a qualified and experienced Design Builder (DB) to provide planning, design, and construction services for the Physical Education & Athletics Shelter Project. The purpose of this solicitation is to secure Statements of Qualification (SQQ) from experienced Design Builders with experience in planning, designing, engineering, and construction of facilities of similar scope and scale.

WSD is proposing to construct an approximately 9000 sq ft clear-span roof structure to provide an outdoor space for physical education, athletics activities, and community sports to be located on the district campus, at 1100 Oaken Hills Dr., Willamina, OR 97396.

The selected Design Builder will be responsible for coordinating with District Staff to identify the project needs, project planning and scope development, design and engineering services, cost estimating, and ultimately construction services.

REQUEST FOR QUALIFICATIONS

Interested Design Builders shall respond to this request by submitting an SOQ of sufficient length and detail to demonstrate their qualifications and experience with regard to similar projects, and their understanding of the project under consideration.

At minimum respondent's SOQ shall include:

Cover Letter. An introduction to the respondent's team and brief history of the firm(s), summarize their understanding of the project, and a description of the services your firm proposes to provide WSD.

Key Personnel. Identify each firm's key personnel, relevant qualifications, and role they will take in the project. List and describe any actions taken by any regulatory agency against any member of the design build team in the last 5 years.

Experience. 3 to 4 design and/or construction projects that are relevant to the work contemplated by this RFQ. Include the following for each: Location, timeframe, size, construction type, cost. and owner.

Approach. Describe the Design Builder's approach to completing the work.

Address both pre-construction and construction activities. This section provides an opportunity to present detailed project management strategies.

EVALUATION

WSD will evaluate each SOQ submitted based on responsiveness to the district's needs. The award of contract, when made, will be to the Design Builder who is responsive to all administrative and technical requirements of the RFQ, who has demonstrated competence and qualifications in the type of services required, and who receives the highest rating based upon the competence and professional qualifications to perform the services required. Evaluation criteria shall include:

- Competence to perform the services as reflected by general experience, experience in providing the required services, and the qualifications and competence of persons who would be assigned to perform the services.

- Ability to perform the services as reflected by workload and the availability of adequate personnel, financial resources, equipment, and facilities to perform the services expeditiously.

- Past performance as reflected by the evaluation of others who have retained the services of the Design Builder with respect to factors such as control of costs, quality of work, and an ability to meet deadlines.

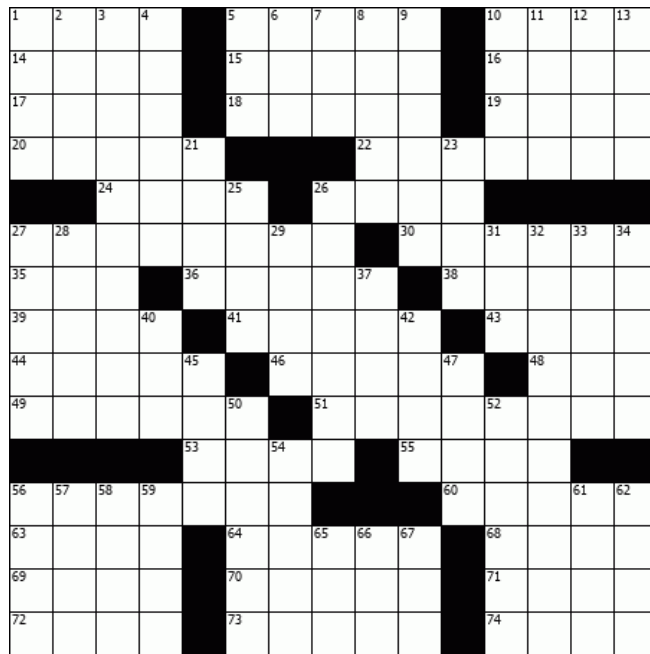

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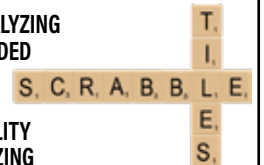

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How to Build a Better Burger, Tips and Tricks

Backyard barbecue season is starting to heat up. Although many people grill all year long, grilling season kicks into high gear in spring and summer.

Burgers will always be quint-essential grilling fare. It should come as no surprise that the month of May is National Ham- burger Month. That's likely due to Memorial Day weekend which many view as the unofficial start of summer - being one of the first times of the year people begin grilling burgers. Despite burgers' popularity, it's easy to make mistakes when preparing them. These tips can help any- one build a better burger.

Use freshly ground meat

Buying ready-made ground meat (of any variety) is taking a gamble because you don't know when it was ground, how many animals it came from or how it was handled. By freshly grinding the meat at home you will have greater control over the cut of meat and the fat content. Personally ground meat will be fresher, especially when you get nice cuts of meat directly from your local butcher. Top chefs suggest dicing cold meat into

chunks and freezing for about 10 minutes prior to grinding for the best results.

Fat is key

For the most juicy, flavorful burger, you'll want a ratio of 80 percent meat to 20 percent fat. Some people like to eat lean, but with a burger, the fat will be necessary and it's better to select leaner meats for other dishes.

Don't overwork the meat

Handling the burger patties too much can lead to dense, tough burgers. Gently shape the burgers into round, 1-inch thick, flat discs. To prevent the burgers from rounding in the middle during cooking, press a dimple with your thumb in the center of the patty to help it cook evenly. It's a smart idea to weigh each patty to ensure uniformity of size and even cooking.

Don't add salt early on. Salt added to the ground meat before it's shaped can draw the liquid out of the meat, leaving a dry burger behind. Sprinkle salt sparingly while it is cooking for flavoring.

Avoid overcooking

Most health authorities recom- mend not leaving any pink meat in a burger made from ground

meat. According to BBC Good Food, burgers can be cooked for 5 to 6 minutes on each side for medium and 8 to 9 minutes per side for well done. For the best results, use a food thermometer to check internal temperature. The USDA says ground meat, whether it's pork, veal, beef, or lamb, should be cooked to 160 F.

Flip as desired

The cooking resource Serious Eats debunked the myth that burgers should only be flipped once. Flipping the burger repeatedly, as often as once every 15 seconds, encourages faster, more even internal cooking and can dramatically reduce cooking time.

Keep the patties separate

Let everyone build their own burgers, as keeping the cooked meat away from the burger buns for as long as possible will reduce the chances of the juices making the buns soggy. Soft, squishy buns tend to make for good burger eating, as they will not overwhelm the meat with too much crusty bread.

The smell of grilling burgers is in the air. Ensure that every burg- er is a masterpiece by utilizing some important cooking tips.

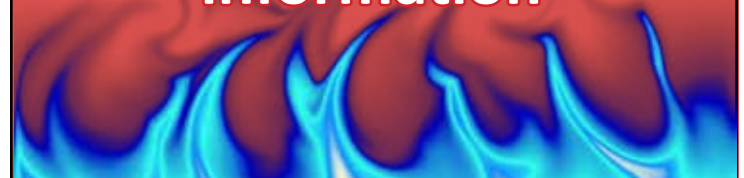


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Spartans, Bulldogs Softball Add Wins to Record Last Week

Coach Larry Samples honored

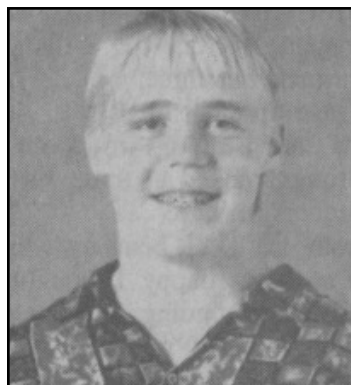
his boys basketball team. The Spartans finished with a 15-7 season record and made it to the second game of the league playoffs.

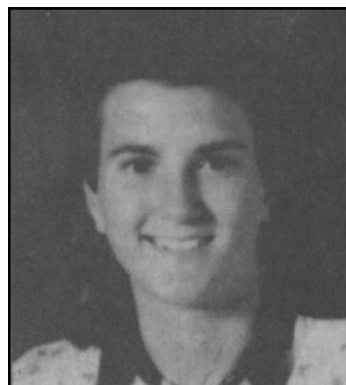

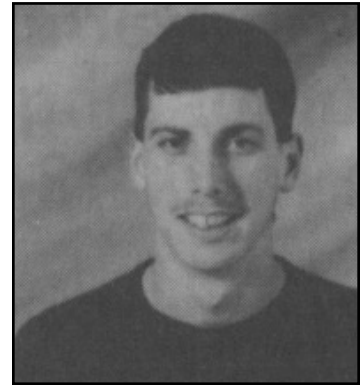

Ruff Life Supplements with Resale Store

Thursday, Ruff Life Rescue celebrated the grand opening of a new resale store in downtown Willamina. The non-profit dog rescue decided to open the small store at 242 North Main Street, right next to Oddfellows Pizza, to raise awareness of the organization, advertise local dogs available for adoption, and supplement much-needed revenue to continue its cause.

George Peterson and his daughter Angie run the organization along with their Ruff Life Kennels in Grand Ronde.

On the sidewalk and inside the store, dog clothing, food, candles, and spray for pet odor control, along with non-pet-related items like antique toy trucks, glassware, planters, and other knickknacks can be found.

George said their organization can house up to 20 dogs at a time, and he currently has 19 that they care for. He hopes to see an increase in adoption, one of the main reasons for the new storefront, so that they can bring in more dogs needing assistance instead of turning them away. Their monthly operating costs range from \$5,000 to \$7,000 a month, and having \$500 a week in sales at the store helps with

their mission.

However, you do not need to purchase something to swing by the store. George is always willing to talk about their organization, answer questions about raising or adopting a furry friend, or just have a general chit-chat. Their store is open 11 a.m. to 5 p.m., Thursday through Saturday.

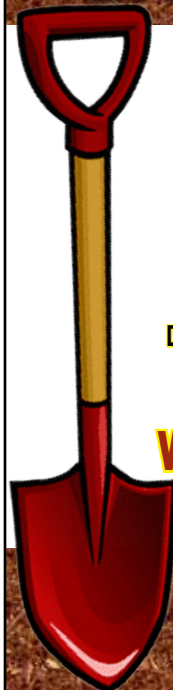
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
